Pastor Calvin Hill's Message

It has come upon us, the month of December and stories of Christ along with many family gatherings will be told. Some of us may recall past gifts--gifts that we may be grateful for and some we wish never to receive again.

One year, I remember seeing all the boys in the mission school receiving truck toys, little army play sets, and farm animals. I got a pair of wool socks! I was like, 'I can't play with these socks!' Disappointed, I watched the boys play with their new toys. I even asked if they would let me join with them, but I didn't get to. So, I just watched. Then one day, it was cold out and the boys had to run into the dorm and change their shoes and socks. I had my gifted wool socks on, and all the boys wanted me to play with their toys until they returned. Oh, was I happy! It was a graceful moment, and I played for hours that morning. In the Christmas story, we see God turning His attention to His promises and acting on them to fulfill His word—wonderfully counseling us when in need, being a Mighty God when trials seem overcoming, protecting every time we need a Father, and bringing much needed Peace during chaos.

Finally, God understands us. When Christ came, He came into a broken world—a world of suffering and sin. He became fully human and experienced the full range of human emotions, desires, sorrows, and joys. As 'human of sorrows' (Isaiah 53:3), Christ understands our pains. He is not indifferent from the experiences and emotions we experience. He can honestly say, "I get it, I understand." So, whatever you are going through, know you are not alone. God understands.

The gift is that God invites us to come and receive His grace to help us in our weakness 'For a child has been born for us.' May this be a blessed Christmas to your soles, so much so that you melt the souls of others.



ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL BEGINS STUDY OF APOSTLE PAUL

Adult Sunday School participants have begun a six-week study of Apostle Paul using the book, *The Call: The Life and Message of the Apostle Paul*, by Adam Hamilton.

"The Apostle Paul's writings have shaped the lives of one-third of the world's population ...second only to Jesus in his influence on Christian faith, ...his witness defines what it means to follow Jesus Christ." The study shares Paul's story and message, creating an understanding for our own lives and for our world today.

Led by Pastor Ron Sample, the adult Bible study sessions begin with a video narrated by Adam Hamilton, followed by group discussion.

TRUSTEES ADDRESS OTHER PROJECTS

Our two big projects for the year—the soffit, facia and gutter repair and the roof replacement—are now complete and final insurance checks for the roofing project have now been received. However, there is a long list of small projects that we hope to complete this fall.

Due to the increased cost of services and materials, we have requested a budget increase to \$7,500 for the 2024 fiscal year.

Our insurer, Church Mutual, has been faced with pressure from their insurers to bring down costs; and they have been forced to delete hail and windstorm coverage from our 2024 property coverage. Our policy has been renewed for 2024 with those exceptions, and our Church Mutual Account Manager is presently shopping for replacement coverage for us.

Since the Trustees announced the removal of the shed, we have had someone volunteer to take it.

An inspection will be made of the structure of the old steeple and abandoned ductwork in the west wing of the church.

The Trustees are working on replacing the furnace for the north end of the basement. This is the oldest furnace in the church, and it has quit working. It has been modified over the years, and a recently discovered error on one of those modifications is a potential hazard. We hope to have the work completed soon.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES

Sunday School attendance continues to increase. On November 5, we celebrated having 20 children and youth—the greatest number since we reinstated Children's Sunday School!

We are currently studying what the Bible tells us about love. Lessons have focused on The Great Commandment; The second Greatest Commandment; and, most recently, Corinthians 1:13, "Love is patient, love is kind..."

We are planning to open a second classroom as soon as possible! Opening a second classroom will make age-appropriate instruction available to both groups of students and alleviate the crowding in the classroom we are often seeing!

While that is great news for our Church and our children's program, it also MUST be viewed as a call for more teachers! The United Methodist Church requires TWO adults in each room, and currently we cannot staff the second room! Prayerfully consider committing to help. Ideally, we should have three adults for each age group so we can schedule a rotation that allows the adults to attend worship service as well.
