

CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES



Future classes include Communion as a memorial to Christ; an invitation to the Holy Spirit; oneness with Christ and all Christians; and Communion as









NEW ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL STUDY

Nearly everyone has heard of the Ten Commandments, the list of "thou-shalt-nots" found in the Bible. Jesus saw these commandments not as onerous burdens, but as guideposts to help us experience a good and beautiful life. These ten ancient "words" were given to us by a loving God who longed to set safe boundaries, create order out of chaos, help communities live peacefully, and protect us--often from ourselves.

TRUSTEES MAKE PROGRESS ON PROJECTS

The Board of Trustees met March 5, 2024. Present were Melvin Costa, Rev. Calvin Hill, Adam McFarlin, Betty Petranek representing SPRC, Lavonne Roberts, Sharon Roness, Jake Shook and Carl Sundstrom.

Sharon reported that Church Mutual added water and hail coverage to our insurance policy effective January 1, 2024, at an annual cost of \$1,602, with a 5% deductible for those hazards and an option to buy down the deductible for approximately \$1,000 per \$10,000. Later, a proposal was received from Liberty Mutual to replace the Church Mutual policy with a 1% water/hail deductible for \$12,568 per year, but its liability provisions do not appear to meet Conference standards. Dierdre McGee was consulted and suggested asking if they would offer property coverage only. No answer has been received to that question to date. At the end of February, Pamela Keeser of Church Mutual notified us that she is submitting property coverage applications to two more companies; we supplied the information she needed to complete these applications. Meanwhile, we do have complete coverage with Church Mutual but with the 5% water/hail deductible.

Work is progressing on the basement Sunday School rooms. The firewall in the youth room has been painted but needs calking. Modifying the shelves to accommodate a TV to stream Christian programs for class discussion has been proposed. Flooring in the classroom has been completed and the walls painted. Furniture moving and vinyl baseboard installation and miscellaneous painting is left.

Summit Plumbing & Heating expects to have their plumbing and heating work completed by our next meeting.

Carl met with Howard Bogue to discuss moving the lighting controls presently in the youth room and will be reporting to the committee on relocating the stage lighting controls.

The ceramic tiles for the parsonage basement arrived at CLT, and the work has been scheduled with the Hills.

Discussions were held on several projects including additional heating upgrades, installation of televisions in the Children's Sunday School classrooms, and Internet security.

The requirements of Paragraph 258 of the Book of Discipline were discussed in detail, and the consensus of everyone present is that the church needs to establish its own policy on contracting and employment as soon as possible.

SPECIAL OFFERING

The Finance Committee thanks everyone who donated generously to the UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) Sunday offering. A total of \$1,130 was collected for this special United Methodist Church offering. Additionally, the UMW (United Methodist Women) matched \$1,000 of the congregational giving. Therefore, FUMC-Newcastle will send \$2,130 to UMCOR.
