# PASTOR'S MESSAGE: LIGHT OF THE WORLD

The days are getting shorter. By the time evening comes, many of us are surprised at how quickly the sun slips below the horizon. It reminds me of a fall evening years ago when the power was not connected to our homes. The house grew darker and darker, every familiar space seemed strange. I found myself fumbling through shadows until a candle or lantern was lit. Suddenly, out of the darkness came resemblance of the rooms, direction, and peaceful comforts of home. In John, Jesus said.

"I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life." (John 8:12)

October has a way of teaching us about light. The world reminds us of how the seasons shift, yet light still shines. Jesus tells us that he is the light of the world. His promise is not that there will be darkness, but that we will not have to walk through it alone. His light brings hope, vision, and the assurance that God is leading us forward.

God. As we look to the future, somtimes dimness is God's way of preparing.





## **UMW MAKES DONATIONS**

The United Methodist Women (UMW) met on Wednesday, September 3, with twelve women in attendance. Maxine Groner gave the devotion before the business meeting. During the meeting, we:

- Approved the following donations: \$1,500 to Totes of Hope to purchase blankets for kids, \$700 to B.R.E.A.D. for Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets, \$1,000 from the Flower Fund to the church's General Fund, \$500 to purchase three streetlights for a village in Zambia
- Discussed the "Christmas in Wyoming" bazaar, which will be held Saturday, November 22 (NOTE: We will not have a New2You booth this year.)
- Agreed to sponsor the Operation Christmas Child Shoebox project (see related article)
- Approved the selling of fresh Georgia pecans and chocolate treats

# SCHOLARSHIP AVAILABLE

The Newcastle First United Methodist Church scholarship deadline for spring semester 2026 is November 1, 2025. Application materials are available in the church office or from Phyl Sundstrom (941-1251) and Chris French (746-5783).

The \$500 scholarship is available to applicants pursuing a degree in human service. Applicants must have completed one year of education beyond high school and must be members of, or affiliated with, Newcastle First United Methodist Church.

#### TRUSTEES MEET

The Board of Trustees met September 9. In attendance at the meeting were Reverend Hill, Carl Sundstrom, Lavonne Roberts, Adam McFarlin, Melvin Costa, and Sharon Roness.

Reverend Hill offered the opening prayer. Carl offered a motivational thought from Albert Einstein: "The definition of insanity is doing the same thing the same way and expecting different results."

The August minutes were corrected and approved. Carl gave a financial report.

Sharon and Carl from Trustees along with Reverend Hill and Betty Petranek attended a very important Zoom meeting concerning the amount this church will commit as its share of the co-pay requirement for the RAN Grant. The required 20% matching funds for the proposed \$45,000 grant will be approximately \$9,000. The improvements to be funded by the grant are estimated to reduce our energy consumption (and, by extension, electrical and natural gas expenses) by 50%, year in and year out. Additionally, replacing inoperative windows, upgrading light fixtures, plus a furnace and water heater that are nearing the end of their expected service life are included in the grant.

Replacing the failed light bulb in Fellowship Hall did not fix the problem with the 73-year-old fixture, an indication that those fixtures need to be replaced. Funds are available for this work as well as upgrading all fluorescent lighting to LED's through the RAN Grant, if the requirement for matching funds is met.

The Trustees will pay 21 Electric \$1,976.76 for exit/egress sign installation in addition to approximately \$1,600 already paid for materials. This upgrade was mandated by the insurance company with a deadline that did not allow for normal budgeting adjustments. It was noted that our savings is at the threshold we have established for contingencies such as furnace replacement or other emergencies which could potentially limit the Trustees activities for the remainder of the budget cycle, such as the installation of a sprinkler head for the problem area in the center of the lawn.

Temporary signs meeting the Fire Marshall's requirements have been posted. Replacement door actuators and fire wall repair in the furnace room need to be completed. The Fire Marshall has been very helpful with identifying approved replacement door actuators. The Trustees completed the required monthly tests of the smoke alarms and exit/egress lights after their meeting; all functioned normally.


In response to the Finance Committee's request, the Trustees proposed \$7,500 for the 2026 Trustees maintenance budget.

Invitation Sunday was discussed.

A work day for installing the new mailbox was set for Saturday, September 27, starting at 9am. The annual work day to inspect and clean the gutters was set for Saturday, October 4, at 9am, weather permitting, with Saturday, October 11, at 9am as an alternative date.

The next Trustee meeting will be held Tuesday, October 7, at 6pm in the Parlor.

Melvin offered a closing prayer. Meeting adjourned at 8pm.
